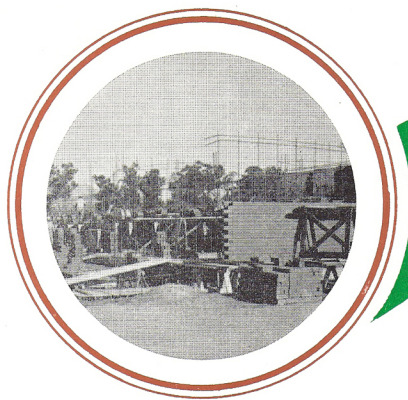

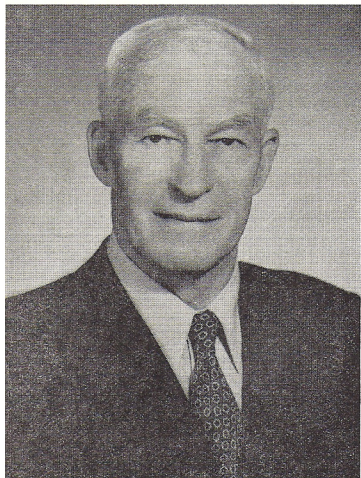

FOREWORD



During the latter part of the decade between 1940 and 1950 the state authorities of California authorized the establishment of a state school in southern California for the education of children whose hearing was severely impaired. Through the efforts of Mr. Perry Seely and Mr. Toivo Lindholm the site at Riverside was chosen. Many people helped in the planning.

The school was to have ample room for developing a varied educational program and for outdoor recreational activities; the special equipment was to be the best available; the living arrangements were to avoid as far as possible an institutional impression upon the children and the staff. Most important of all, the superintendent and the staff were to assist the pupils at the school to grow in self-respect, in social co-operation, in zest for learning, and in skills that help to prepare for vocational success.

You who have lived at the school must decide how well the venture has succeeded.

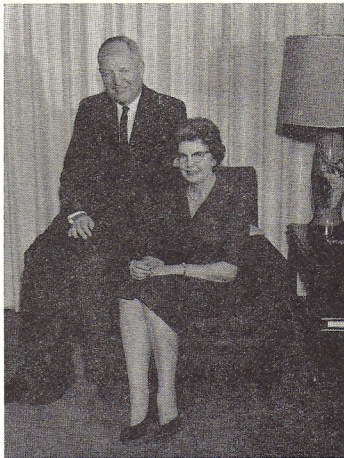

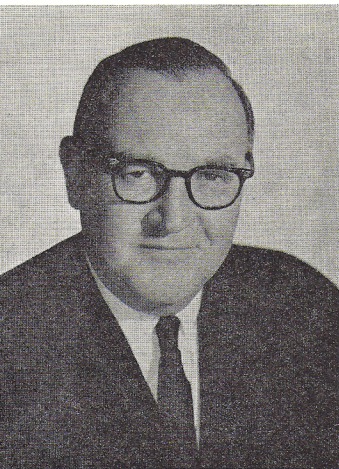
But, because of their devotion our school in the past ten years has grown to be a show place among our nation's educational facilities.

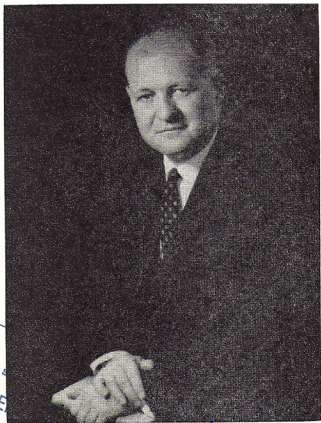

In Retrospect ...

The High School, under the label of Upper School, opened its doors as a separate department in September, 1955. One hundred seven students were listed on its class rolls. Driver Education and Driver Training were part of the curriculum as well as Business Arts which had its beginning this same year. Two years later these subjects were transferred to the Vocational Department.

The month of June, 1956 saw CSDR's first graduating class which consisted of eleven members with one student successfully applying for admission to Gallaudet College.

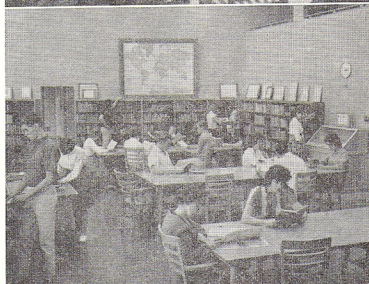
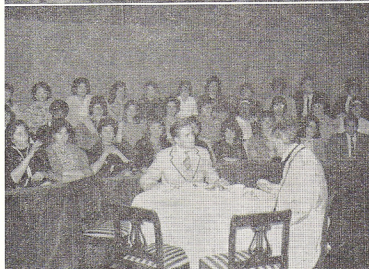
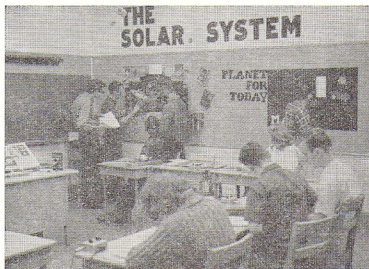
The intervening years have produced an upgrading along academic lines. Students are now receiving more advanced study in Social Studies, English, and Literature. While only four students were taught Algebra in 1955-56, a total of five classes have taken the subject this year. One class has been able to go on to the study of Plane Geometry. Courses in Chemistry, Biology, and Physics have been added to the Science Department.

The school year 1961-62 was quite outstanding in that it saw the inauguration of the program at Riverside City College whereby deaf students were able to enroll in a special program for further education. This was the culmination of a cooperative study made by the school and the college the previous year.

During this same year the name of the department was changed to "High School". Every person in any way connected with the High School students participated in an evaluation by the California Association of Secondary School Administrators which resulted in a fully accredited High School for CSDR.

The current year has been marked by the formation of a student body organization and the largest graduating class in the history of the school — 59 members. Many of this group are planning to continue their education either at Riverside City College or Gallaudet College.

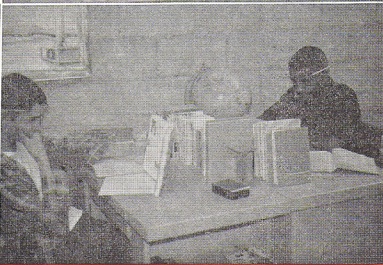
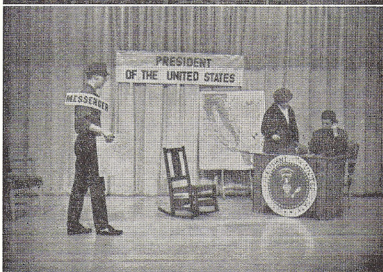
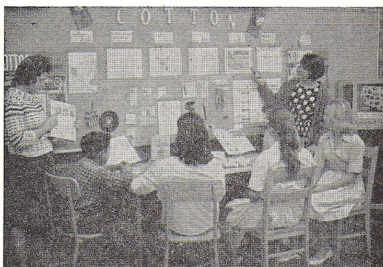
The Junior High School, known as the Middle School, opened its door to an enrollment of seventy students in September, 1953 as part of the combined Middle-Upper School Department. The students were between the ages of ten and fifteen. There were eight teachers on the staff. The school day consisted of seven forty-five minute periods; classes began at nine o'clock in the morning and closed at three-thirty in the afternoon. There was one period of physical education for each class each day. Art was taught in the classroom by a special teacher one day a week. Speech, speech-reading and auditory training were taught by the homeroom teachers. There were no vocational classes for the Middle School students.

In September of 1955 the Middle School became a separate department with a student population of approximately one hundred twenty. The school day was lengthened to eight periods by opening at eight-thirty and closing at three forty-five. The staff was increased to twelve. Vocational training and rhythm were offered to Middle School classes for the first time.

In September, 1957 due to the expansion program the Middle School became known as the Intermediate School. The staff was increased to fourteen with a student body of one hundred thirty. Speech, taught by a special teacher, was added to the curriculum. The two wings of classrooms jutting out from "P" building toward the Palomar Residential Halls were opened.

In 1961 the Intermediate School was given a new name, the Junior High School.

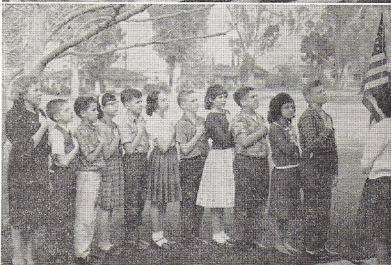
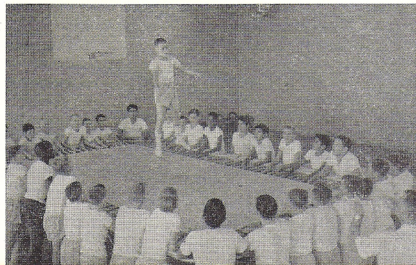
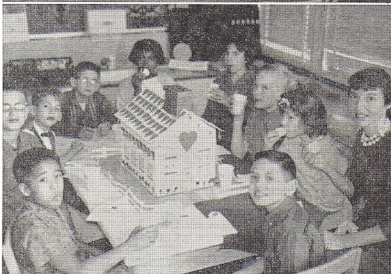
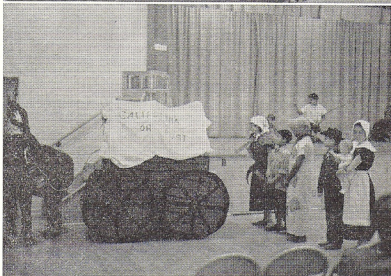
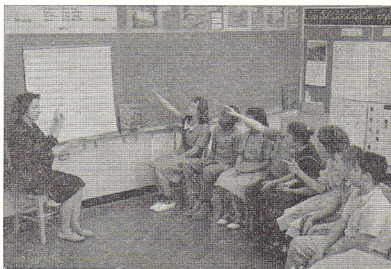
In the spring of 1957 plans were made to establish a fourth academic department; this was to be Elementary School, for pupils from approximately nine and a half through twelve years of age. In September 1957 Elementary School opened with ninety students and ten classroom teachers. Of the ninety children who made up the original group in Elementary, fifty-four are still attending CSDR. Some are now in Junior High School and some are in our High School. Of the original group of teachers, four are still in Elementary School.

The second year (1958-1959) Elementary School expanded to fourteen teachers and 121 students. From then on there have been fourteen teachers, and the ratio of teacher to student has been one to nine.

Elementary School is now in its sixth year. Looking back, happy highlights that come to mind are some cases of outstanding academic achievement by individual students; certain classes that represented a fine combination of abilities, habits, and accomplishment; some field trips such as the trip to the San Diego Zoo and the train trips to Los Angeles by social studies classes; assembly programs and certain school parties; and the presence always of certain outstanding teachers effectively producing worthwhile results.

Elementary School's function is to educate students and to help them grow and develop; it is part of a continuum through which the students travel up from Lower School and on to Junior High and High School.

In Retrospect . . .

When CSDR opened in February, 1953 fifty-six children were in attendance. These children were all under ten years of age. They were grouped into seven classes. These children, their seven teachers and supervising teacher made up the original Lower School and formed the nucleus of what was destined to be one of the most outstanding schools for deaf children in the world.

In the fall of 1953 Lower School became one of three academic departments in the school. It expanded from seven classes to twelve classes with a total enrollment of ninety-six children. It was necessary to use the teachers' workroom and the Lower School library as classrooms in order to accommodate the additional students.

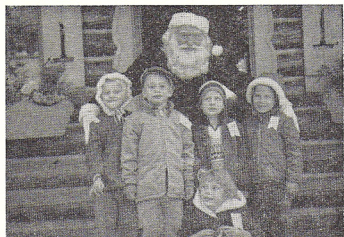
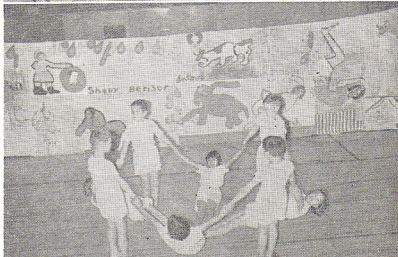
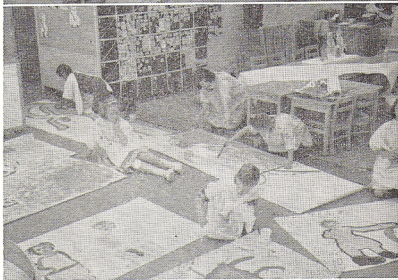
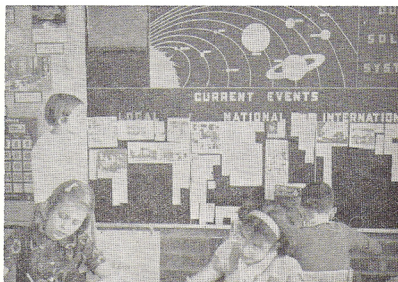
Construction was begun on a new unit for Lower School in 1956. The buildings, which included both classrooms and dormitories, were ready for occupancy when school opened in September, 1957. All Lower School classes except the Kindergarten moved to the new location. The supervising teacher moved into her new office at this time also. By this time the department had grown to one hundred twelve children in fourteen classes.

At the advent of the tenth anniversary of CSDR, the Lower School proudly boasts of one hundred twenty children and fifteen teachers.

Of the original Lower School staff three teachers and the supervising teacher are still in service at CSDR. Mrs. Doris DeLong and Miss Helen Toner continue teaching in Lower School. Mrs. Hritz became a teacher in Elementary School at its beginning in September, 1957.

The past decade has been an interesting and challenging one. It is with confidence and enthusiasm that the next one is approached.

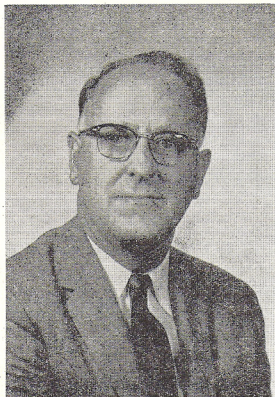
Vocational Department

In Retrospect . . .

Although CSDR is now ten years old the Vocational Department has to wait until 1965 to gain that goal. Prior to 1955, there was no vocational building and only offerings of bakery, homemaking and general shop were available. September, 1955 saw the opening of our Vocational Department with Howard H. Rahmlow as Supervising Teacher. In addition to Bakery with Mr. Rudolph Ackerman and Homemaking with Miss Gladys Chapman a number of new shops and teachers came to CSDR. Mr. James Meeks who had been teaching General Shop became the General Metal Shop teacher and Mr. William Peters took over the General Industrial Arts Shop. Other shops opened at that time and their teachers were: Art and Mechanical Drawing, Mr. Felix Kowalewski; Printing, Mr. Toivo Lindholm; Spotting and Pressing, Mr. Joseph Pepe; Power Sewing, Mrs. Connie Schuman and Cabinetmaking-Upholstery, Mr. Evan Ellis.

Since our opening in 1955, several new units of instruction have been added and currently, in addition to the above, we now have courses and teachers as follows: Business Arts, Mrs. Page Barber; General Electricity, Mr. Henry Zink; Horticulture, Mr. Sandy Aklufi and Offset Printing, Mr. Thomas Fishler. Miss Joanne Meek is now the teacher of Homemaking. Driver Education and Driver Training are also taught by teachers of the Vocational Department.

Continued growth and change of offerings are anticipated to meet the needs of our changing industrial world but at the present time there are no definite plans in view.
