# In Retrospect...

When CSDR opened in February 1953 the medical staff consisted of: Edward W. Zeman, M.D., Pediatrician; Vean M. Stone, M.D., Ophthalmologist; Theodore M. Hughes, M.D., Otologist; Edward Neblett, D.D.S., Dentist; Mrs. Grace Constable, R.N.

The infirmary was not completed at this time so it was necessary to provide temporary quarters for the school health services. One of the two room apartments was made available for a dispensary. Two adjoining rooms were reserved for the acutely ill students who had to be kept in bed. At this time the major part of the program was ready to function.

In 1953, when school reopened in September, the infirmary was completed and ready for occupancy. The nursing staff was increased to four Registered Nurses. Appointed to the staff were Mrs. Norene Laughlin, Margarette Tornell and Mrs. Ann Nagle. Mrs. Vera Gordon, housekeeper, joined the staff in 1954. Later additions to the staff were Miss Verna Peeler, R.N., who replaced Mrs. Ann Nagle; Frank Willis, M.D., Psychiatrist, and Harry B. Frey, M.D., Otologist who replaced Theodore M. Hughes, M.D., on his retirement.

In September of 1955 when the enrollment increased from 234 to 335 the girl's dormitories for the new students were not ready for occupancy. There was not time to notify the families of the new students, therefore, it was decided to convert the two wards in the infirmary into a temporary dormitory.

From the enrollment of the first students until the present enrollment of apprioximately 520 students the health services have been a persistent, progressive program, under the direction of a capable medical staff.

The school health program functions in close cooperation with the Riverside County Health Department and with the State Department of Public Health.

Our beautiful new kitchen and dining room was opened for limited use in February 1953 with 56 students enrolled Mr. John McCaffery was the Supervising Cook. There were two cooks and four Food Service Assistants.

In September 1953 we officially opened with 225 students and a kitchen staff of 15 who were all delighted to be a part of our school.

The Institutions Magazine Honor Award was given to us in 1954 for one of the most outstanding kitchens in the United States. We received a beautiful bronze plaque which hangs in our dining

In November 1957 Mr. McCaffery who had laid the foundation for our efficiert operation was striken with an incurable illness and passed away February 3, 1958. The task of supervising this work was offered to me. It was a great challenge.

Some changes have been made in our operating that I feel have been beneficial. A portion control system has been set up which has eliminated a great deal of work and takes less employees. Groups from other State Institutions are sent here to study the system we are using.

Since the student body has grown to 500 our staff has increased. Mr. Nicholas Phillipson is Supervisor Grade I. We have three cooks and 22 Food Service Assistants and one Janitor. We work as a team and because of this we are sure the progress of the last ten years will continue.



# OPENING FEBRUARY 9, 1953

The American dream of equal opportunity for all is embodied in the new California School for the Deaf at Riverside, which begam first full-lime classes this morning with 50 lower grade children enrolled. Destined to be known as a show place among the nation's educational institutions, the \$4,000,000 school off Arlington Avenue symbolizes American concern for individual welfare forcefully, tangibly. The dramatic lines of CSDR's new buildings, rising on a gentle slope beside orange groves ladened with fruit and lined with tall, Patrician paim trees, provide an impression of mammade beauty not soon to be forgotten. Here, the Golden State will take care of its own. Children who live in a hushed world of eternal silence will find an attractive, home-like atmosphere where special equipment and teaching methods will allow them to learn as rapidly as their more fortunate brothers, where they can play daily in the sparkling Southland sunshine and where they can discover—more than anything else—that their country wants them, needs them. America could offer no better proof of its greatness.
